

ACADEMIC HONORS

Students with outstanding cumulative grade point averages may receive the following honors.

Bronze Tablet

Continuous academic achievement is recognized at the UIUC by inscribing students' names on the Bronze Tablet (http://www.admin.uiuc.edu/policy/code/article_3/a3_3-404.html) which hangs in the campus Library. Bronze Tablet recipients must rank in the top three percent of the students of the College of ACES graduating class and have at least a 3.5 (A = 4.0) cumulative grade point average for all work completed at the University through the academic term prior to their graduation. To be identified as a Bronze Tablet recipient, transfer students—in addition to meeting the general rules for qualification—must also have earned at least 40 semester hours at this University and have cumulative UIUC grade point averages as high as the lowest eligible students who completed all of their academic work on this campus.

Dean's List

Each fall and spring semester, a Dean's List is compiled of those students who have met the necessary academic conditions. The *Code* outlines all eligibility requirements for Dean's List recognition (www.admin.uiuc.edu/policy/code/article_3/a3_3-401.html). An ACES student must meet these criteria: successfully complete at least 14 semester hours of course work (graduating seniors are not required to meet the 14-hour minimum) taken for letter grades of A, B, C, D, and F and earn a grade point average placing the student in the top 20 percent of all ACES students that semester in the student's class (freshman, sophomore, junior, senior).

In accordance with the *Code*, the College determines the minimum GPA that allows approximately 20% of ACES students to be named to the Dean's List. The minimum GPA is reviewed annually and adjusted as needed to maintain the 20% guideline. Beginning Fall 2006, the minimum GPA to be eligible for the ACES Dean's List is 3.60.

Graduation with Honors

In the College of ACES, honors are awarded to academically superior students at graduation, with the honors being designated on the diploma. The cumulative grade point average required for each category of honors is specified as follows: Highest Honors, 3.8; High Honors, 3.5; and Honors, 3.2. Transfer students must meet the minimum cumulative grade point average for the respective honors designation for both the UIUC hours and cumulative hours.

Chancellor's Scholars Program

The Campus Honors Program selects approximately 120 entering freshmen each fall from all UIUC colleges to be Chancellor's Scholars. In most recent years, eight to ten students per class in the College of ACES have been selected to participate in this program. Chancellor's Scholars are expected to take one course offered by the Campus Honors Program per semester for their first two years in the program. In the junior and senior years, students enroll in Interdisciplinary Honors Seminars. More specific information is available from the Campus Honors Program, 1205 W. ACES James Scholar Program

The ACES James Scholar program invites freshmen of superior academic performance (ACT of 28 or higher), and who indicated an interest in honors' activities on their UIUC application, to enroll prior to coming to campus. The program provides opportunities for these students to use their time and talents in ways that can further enrich their educational experience. Students may obtain specific information about the program from the ACES Academic Programs office and the ACES James Scholar website. General information requirements for certification as a James Scholar are described below.

Freshman and Sophomore Years

To be certified as an ACES James Scholar for the first two years, students must meet these criteria:

1. Complete a minimum of 14 graded hours of credit in residence on the UIUC campus for each semester
2. Have a cumulative grade-point average of at least 3.40
3. Complete one Honors Credit Learning Agreement (HCLA) each year. Any regular course can be designated an Honors Course by completing additional honors activities that are mutually acceptable to the instructor and student (the HCLA records this agreement); forms are available in 104 Mumford Hall
4. Attend the ACES Honors Retreat held each spring semester
5. Complete an Honors Completion Plan by April 1 of their sophomore year.

Junior and Senior Years

To be certified as an ACES James Scholar for the junior and senior years, students must meet these criteria:

1. Complete criteria 1–4 for freshmen and sophomores
2. Complete the Honors Completion Plan. Components of the Honors Completion Plan are as follows:
 - a) Complete an independent research project
 - b) Complete at least one 500-level or departmental designated graduate-level course
 - c) Complete at least four 400-level or departmentally designated courses
 - d) Present the results of the research project at the designated event (usually ExplorACES or the ACES Honor Retreat).

Students qualifying for and participating in the ACES James Scholar program receive these benefits:

1. Early registration privileges.
2. Opportunities to interact with honors colleagues at the annual retreat.
3. Opportunities to work more closely with instructors through HCLAs and research projects.
4. Up to \$1,000 deposited in a departmental account to support the undergraduate research project.
5. An Honors Scholarship of \$400 awarded in conjunction with the research project.
6. Emailed newsletters and access to the ACES James Scholar website.

Jonathan Baldwin Turner/Undergraduate Research/Scholarship Program

The Jonathan Baldwin Turner Undergraduate Research/Scholarship Program was created to provide a genuine research experience for upper-level undergraduates who demonstrate superior academic ability and a strong interest in the agricultural and human sciences. Approved undergraduate research projects are conducted under the close supervision of faculty members of the College of ACES, who provide the type of professional guidance normally afforded graduate students pursuing advanced degrees.

To be eligible for the program, a student must meet the following requirements:

1. Have completed a minimum of 60 hours in the undergraduate degree program at the time the proposed research project is conducted
2. Be officially enrolled with a declared academic major in a department of the College
3. Have a minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.0 (4.0 = A) to qualify for undergraduate research support and merit scholarship monies.

Research support for junior or senior students accepted into the program is based on a project budget submitted at the time of application. A maximum stipend of \$1,000 is allocated for each approved research project. Merit scholarship support under the program is \$400.

Prospective applicants work with a faculty member to identify and define an appropriate research project and then submit their requests using the application form approved for the program. Application deadlines of April 1 and November 1, respectively, exist for potential projects beginning in the succeeding fall or spring semester. GENERAL SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

A number of scholarships for undergraduate students enrolled in the College of ACES are made available through the generous support of alumni and friends of the College. There is a separate section for scholarships administered by the College departments. Students seeking consideration for college-wide scholarships complete the online application by the June 1 deadline for scholarships to be awarded for the upcoming academic year.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

College of ACES student organizations are designed to further develop academic and career interests in an informal setting. Students assume the major responsibility for planning and directing organization activities. ACES student organizations include clubs organized around subject-matter specialties, honorary societies, and the College of ACES Student Council. STUDY ABROAD

Students interested in adding an international dimension to their undergraduate experience should contact the assistant dean who coordinates study abroad programs in the ACES Academic Programs office (109 Mumford Hall), as well as the UIUC Study Abroad Office, 115 International Studies Building (<http://www.studyabroad.uiuc.edu/>). Staff members at both locations assist students in defining their academic interests and in narrowing the possible choices of programs. Length of stay (year, semester, summer, or winter break), program location, and the application of credit earned abroad to specific degree requirements are among the decisions students must make.

Assistance with registration at the UIUC and the foreign institution, payment of fees, health certification, and passport and visa questions is available from staff in Academic Programs and the Study Abroad Office. Students prepare course approval forms for each course in which they plan to enroll. A study abroad advisor (one has been assigned for most major fields of study) completes the forms, indicating how the courses compare to University of Illinois courses. The student's academic advisor and ACES Academic Programs assistant dean sign the materials to acknowledge how the courses will be used following transfer of credit from the foreign institution.

The ACES study abroad student will register for ACES 299, "Study Abroad," while away from campus. If this registration is maintained, filing a request for re-entry is not necessary when the student returns to campus. At the conclusion of the experience, an official transcript is forwarded from the foreign institution to the Study Abroad Office for evaluation. The transcript (with a credit recommendation form prepared by the Study Abroad Office) is then referred to ACES Academic Programs for official acceptance and application of credit to the student's degree program. An ACES student can earn up to 36 semester hours of credit for a yearlong experience abroad. Credit also can be earned for an international internship (ACES 293) or for a variety of other international experiences (ACES 298). Interested students should meet with the ACES Academic Programs assistant dean who works with study abroad experiences to discuss the various options.

Many overseas universities cooperate with the University of Illinois in student exchange and study abroad programs. If no formal program exists, study abroad advisors can often assist in the search for an appropriate institution. The College of ACES focuses most efforts on arranging experiences specifically related to the fields of study offered by the College. College-based programs are currently being offered in Brazil, the Caribbean, Denmark, England, France, Germany, Greece, Honduras, the Netherlands, Norway, South Africa, South Korea, and Sweden.

ON-CAMPUS INTERNATIONAL STUDY

Students who have international interests can integrate into their programs of study a wide variety of courses that have an international emphasis. Below is a selection of College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences courses that offer an international focus. Likewise, internationally oriented courses offered by departments in other colleges of the University can be used to fulfill a portion of the open elective hours in each ACES curriculum.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL STUDY

Each year, many ACES students elect to begin graduate or professional study immediately after completing their undergraduate degrees. All of the undergraduate programs in the College can serve as excellent preparation for graduate programs, assuming that the student has maintained a strong academic record and has completed courses that are deemed appropriate for the desired area of graduate study. Graduate study in the College's disciplines and professional study in law, veterinary medicine, health and allied health careers, and business administration are among the most common choices for ACES students and graduates.

Graduate (M.S./Ph.D.) Programs

Admission requirements for graduate study vary greatly among the different fields of study, and there is no centralized admission process for applying to a graduate program within the College of ACES. Each academic unit handles its own application processing. Applications are usually for both admission and financial assistance in the form of fellowships or assistantships. Students are encouraged to contact the specific unit in which they are interested. Graduate admissions personnel within each unit are also an excellent source of information on graduate programs in that discipline at other institutions. Law

Most colleges of law require a bachelor's degree as a prerequisite for admission but do not specify a particular area of undergraduate study. Interested students in the College of ACES may complete the requirements for a degree in any approved curriculum of the College. ACES students who are interested in law school should meet with the Pre- Law Advisor in 270 Lincoln Hall, 333-4923. Veterinary Medicine

A minimum of 60 semester hours of prescribed courses must be completed before a student is considered for admission to the University of Illinois College of Veterinary Medicine (www.cvm.uiuc.edu). Because competition is great, few students are admitted with only the minimum requirements. All students are encouraged to make progress toward a bachelor's degree while they are completing the preprofessional requirements. Students should also consider selecting curricula that lead to viable career alternatives if they are not admitted to the professional college. Many students find the Science, biotechnology, and Pre-Veterinary Medicine concentration within the Animal Sciences major ideal for this purpose. Health & Allied Health Careers

Minimum course requirements for admission consideration to the College of Veterinary Medicine are often similar to those required of candidates to medical schools and other health-related professions. Students in the College of ACES often find curricula in Food Science, Human Nutrition, and Human Development and Family Studies especially applicable to human medicine and related areas. STUDENT DEVELOPMENT AND CAREER SERVICES

ACES Student Development and Career Services specifically serves the career planning and job search needs of students in the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences and is part of a larger campus network of over 25 career services offices. Students are urged to become familiar with all career planning tools available to them early in their academic career and to use those services often throughout their tenure at UIUC.

ACES Student Development and Career Services is part of the Academic Programs Unit within the College of ACES and is located in room 115 on the main floor of the ACES Library, Information, and Alumni Center. The Office is open from 8:30 am - 5:00 pm Monday - Friday. Students are urged to make appointments when seeking assistance, however, walk-in appointments and email correspondence are welcome as well. You can also visit us on the web at www.aces.uiuc.edu/Careers/. Resources are available to all students, including those pursuing an advanced degree rather than employment. ACES Career Services provides resources to assist students with career exploration, writing resumes and other job-related documents, searching for internship and full-time job opportunities, planning for pursuit of an advanced degree, and preparing for job and graduate school interviews.

Each year ACES Career Services hosts an annual career fair and facilitates company presentations, career development events, and hundreds of on-campus interviews. The ACES Career Fair is usually held in early October and is followed by heavy on-campus recruiting events through November in the fall semester. In the spring semester, on-campus recruiting typically occurs from February until Spring Break. IConnectACES, our online job board and on-campus interviewing scheduling system, will keep you abreast of all career development events, job postings, and interviews hosted by ACES Career Services. IConnectACES is a free service provided by students. Students can register to use IConnectACES on the web at www.aces.uiuc.edu/Careers.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Through the ILLINOIS LEADERSHIP initiative, all students on the UIUC campus are encouraged to include some aspect of leadership development in their undergraduate experience. The Campus Leadership Center, 290 Illini Union, 333-0604, offers workshops and programming throughout the year to help students with their leadership journeys. INSIGHT and INTERSECT are two programs especially relevant to freshmen and sophomores; IGNITE and IMPRINT are ideally suited to juniors and seniors. The 25 student organizations in the College of ACES offer many opportunities for students to utilize leadership skills. A Leadership Certificate of Completion is administered by the Leadership Center for students packaging a variety of leadership experiences into the requirements for the program.

Several College of ACES students participate in off-campus leadership programs sponsored by other organizations each year as well. Financial support from College of ACES donors is potentially available for participation in such programs. Information is available from the Student Development and Career Services office.
